- 4. Administration. No administrative problems, Purple Heart received 26 October 1965 for delivery to Sagt L. M. RANCATTI,
- 5. Civil Affairs/Military Covernment/Community Relations.
- a. Civil affairs continues on a daily basis in all hamlets of the Hoa Khanh. The medical program is increasing each week and the results are proving very satisfactory. Corpsmen from the Battalian have provided medical treatment for 745 nationals of the village of Hoa Khanh.
- b. The civil affairs program and community relations can be considered excellent in all respects.
- 6. Intelligence. Enemy activity was light with minor incidents listed below.

- 7. Training. Due to heavy job consistments during the reporting period, no training was conducted.
- 8. Special Operations. None.
- 9. Muclear, Biological and Chemical Warfare. None.
- 10. Command and Control. The Battalion Staff and Company Commanders remain unchanged since last report.
- 11. Air Defense. Air defense remains the same as previously reported. Four M-50s with antimircraft mounts are strategically located around the Battalion area.

12. Logistics.

- a. During this period the main logistics problem experienced was the availability of repair parts for motor transport/engineer equipment. Although the Battalian carried 60 DOS of repair parts (30 DOS operating stock, 30 DOS mount out), the difference in usage of the equipment during extended field operations versus garrison operations caused a deficit in required parts and consequently incurred longer deadline periods.
- b. The Battalion construction platoon was employed primarily doing the following type work: Carpentry maintenance at the CG's quarters and moss and the ADC's quarters, mill work for the CG's quarters, profab-

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rication and distribution of 60 strongbacks for general purpose tents, supervisory work at FLSC for the renovation of 30 varehouses (which stands at 11 completion) and 2/3 cantenment for the construction of strongback tents. Within the Battalion area, the construction platoon did sign painting as required and acted as issue point for construction material for internal and cantonment projects.

- e. The Battalion utilities plateen was employed daing the following: Electricians, completed the CG's quarters and mass and the ADC's quarters. anciated the 3rd Engineer Battalion wiring the billeting area at Headquorters Battalion cantonment, relocated the power supply plant at III MAF Honoguarters, installed floodlights around the Battalion perimeter, neighbored the primary and secondary power systems within the Dattalion arca, installed lighting at the CG's heliport and completed 75% of the olectrical work at the Headquarters Battalion 1600 man mesa hall. The plumbers completed all plumbing requirements at the CG's mess and quarters and the ADC's quarters, laid an additional 3000 feet of 2 inch pipe at Meadquarters Battalion cantonment, completed 75% of the plumbing requirenexts at the Headquarters Battalion cantonment and installed a 3000 gallon water storage tank at the CG's mess and quarters area. The water supply section rebuilt the 2/3 dam, provided 1,435,000 gallons of potable water at four separate water points, provided two shower units (one for this Battalion and one for 2/3), and are involved in drilling a well at Headquarters Bettalion cantonment which now stands at 69 feet and drilling.
- d. The Battalion supply section has maintained the Battalion's supply dumps which now contain the following: Class I, 520 cases of MCIs, class III, 81 drums of mogas, 100 drums of diesel and 30 drums of other POL products, class V, S.5 S/T of small arms and .7 S/T of high explosives. They have processed approximately 3600 requisitions of which 2800 were sent to FLSC.
- e. The Battalion maintenance section has worked continually on a 24 hour basis to service/repair 176 pieces of engineer equipment and 230 pieces of motor transport equipment. The machine shop has completed 21 jobs not related to maintenance of equipment and the welding shop has completed 20 such jobs including the fabrication of a campy for the walkesy from the CC's mess to his quarters.
- f. The Battalion's motor transport equipment has traveled 115,223 railes rainly on construction projects.
- g. The Battalian aid station treated 131/ military patients, 35 of which were referred to Company "G", 3rd Medical Battalian for admission and further treatment.
- h. The Battalion meas section is operating on a 24 hour basis and has fed 60,000 meals during this period.

- 14. Major Farth Work. Due to a high priority on route 268, Da Son and 12th Marines roads, two quarry pits and one borrow pit have continued operations on a 24 hour basis. A total of 17,720 cubic mards of fill and 900 cubic yards of crushed rock has been applied to these roads during the reporting period.
